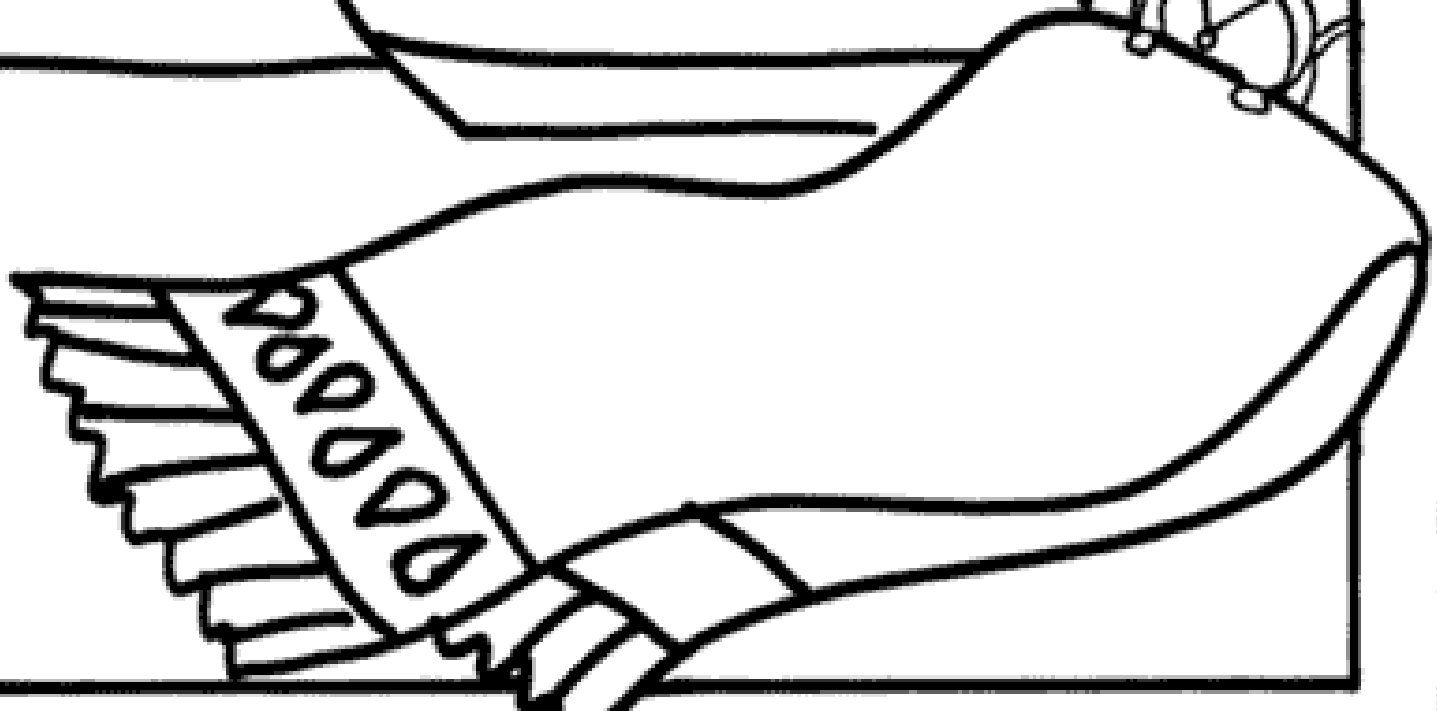
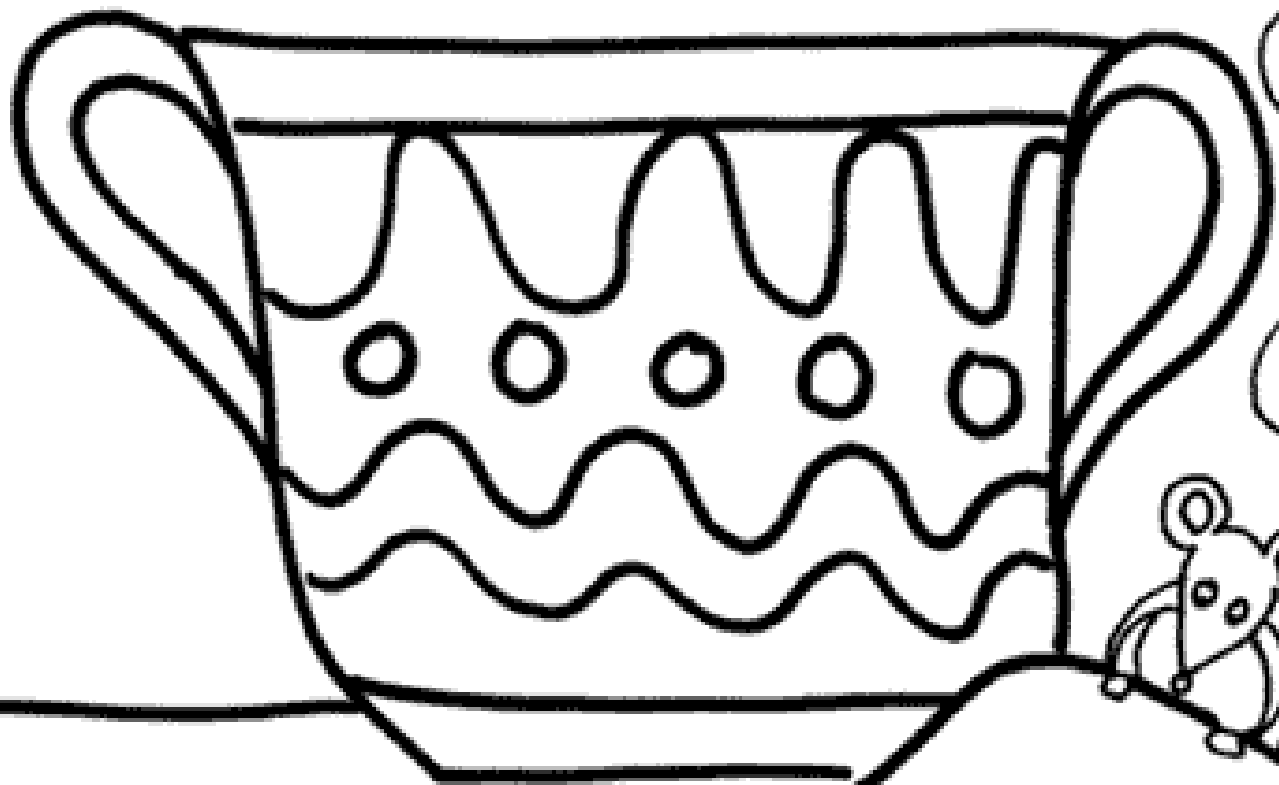
**PASSOVER:**
